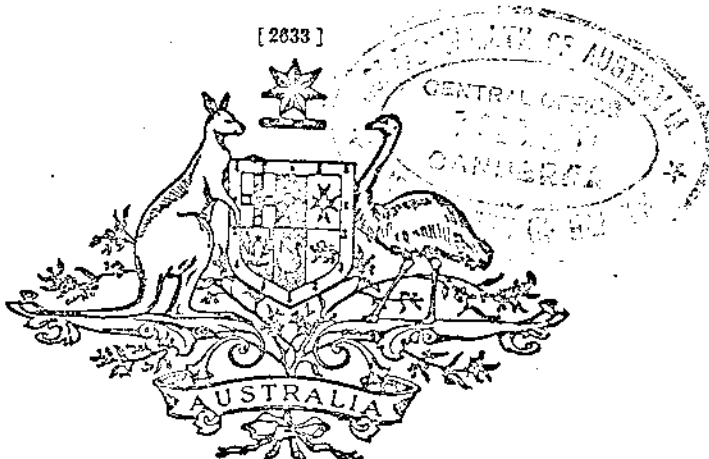

ADMINISTRATIVE ARRANGEMENTS.

ORDERED BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.

I, ALEXANDER GORE ARKWRIGHT, BARON GOWRIE, the Governor-General in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, do hereby approve of the Administrative Arrangements specified in the Schedule hereto, and do order that, until further Order herein, all Acts of the Commonwealth Parliament relating to the matters specified in the second column of the Schedule opposite to the name of a Department (including the Acts specified in the third column opposite to the name of a Department) shall, unless the contrary intention appears in the Act, be administered by the Minister of State for the Commonwealth administering that Department.

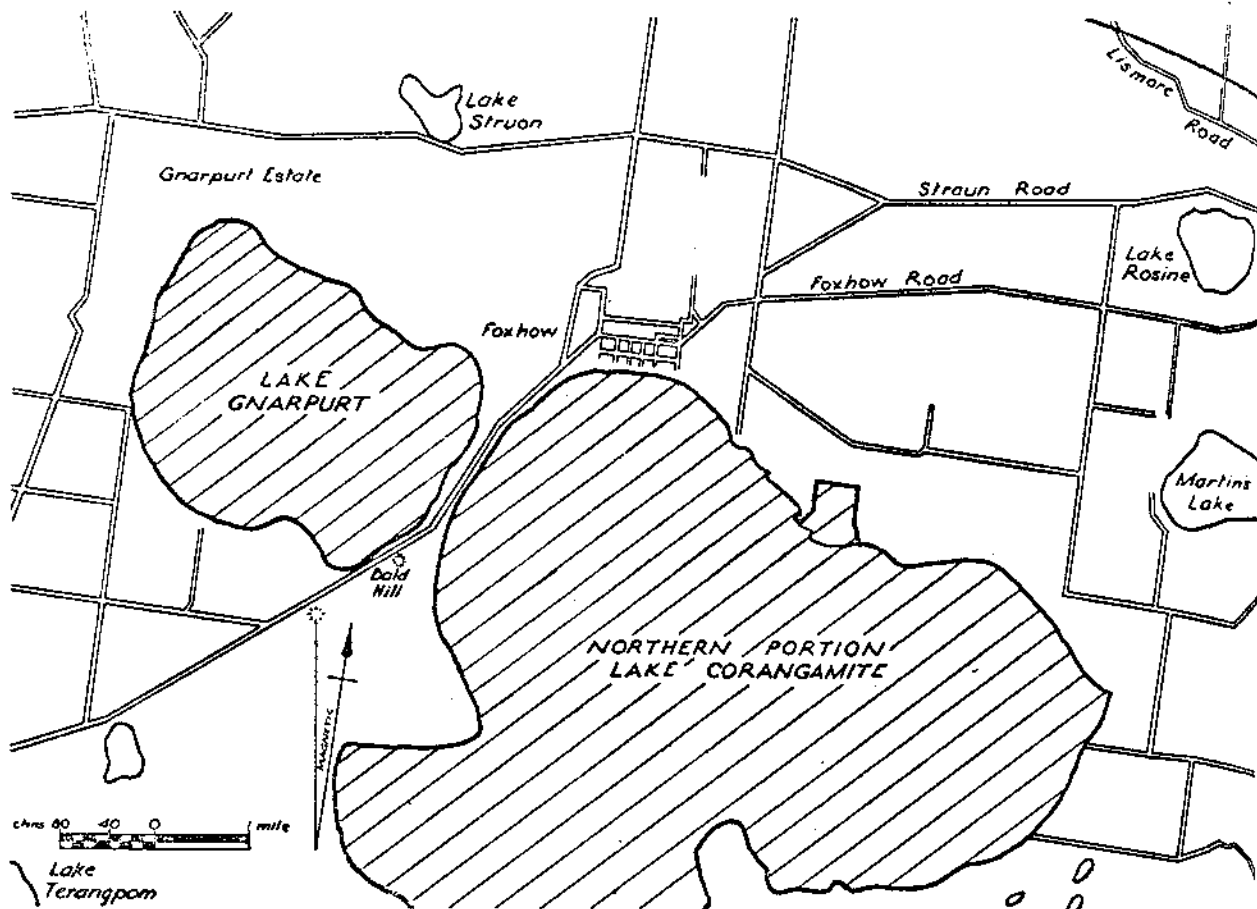

NATIONAL SECURITY (PRICES) REGULATIONS.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 2153.

Tomatoes—Queensland.

IN pursuance of the powers delegated to me by the Commonwealth Prices Commissioner pursuant to regulation 46 of the National Security (Prices) Regulations, I, Horace Eddy Bishop, Second Assistant Prices Commissioner, Prices Branch, Canberra, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 2153.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 1228, as amended by Prices Regulation Orders Nos. 1232, 1300, 1339, 1368, 1415, 1528, 1634, 1821, 1890 and 2093 is hereby revoked.

Definitions and interpretations.

3.—(1.) In this Order unless the contrary intention appears, "prescribed area" means any of the following areas in Queensland:—

- (a) All that area constituted under the name of "City of Brisbane" by the City of Brisbane Act of 1924 of the State of Queensland.
- (b) All that area comprised within a radius of three miles from the general post office at Rockhampton.
- (c) All that area comprised within a radius of three miles from the general post office at Townsville.
- (d) All that area comprised within a radius of three miles from the general post office at Cairns.

(2.) For the purpose of this Order where any tomatoes are sold by the case that sale shall be deemed to be a sale of—

- (a) in the case of a half bushel case—24 pounds weight;
- (b) in the case of a three-quarter bushel case—36 pounds weight; or
- (c) in the case of a bushel case—48 pounds weight.

Sales by growers.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which tomatoes may be sold in Queensland to be—

- (a) for sales in a prescribed area—8d. per pound;
- (b) for sales outside a prescribed area—
 - (i) where delivery is made at the grower's premises—6½d. per pound;
 - (ii) where delivery is made at any place other than the grower's premises—6½d. per pound plus cost of transport actually incurred by the grower and properly attributable to the conveying of the tomatoes from the grower's premises to the place of delivery. Provided that no amount shall be added for cost of transport under the provisions of this subparagraph unless such amount is recorded by the grower on an invoice delivered in relation to those tomatoes.

Sales by wholesale.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which tomatoes may be sold in Queensland by wholesale, other than by a grower, to be the sum of the following:—

- (a) the price paid or payable for the tomatoes by the wholesale seller, or the maximum price fixed by paragraph 4 for the sale of the tomatoes to the wholesale seller, whichever is the lesser;
- (b) cost of transport actually incurred by the wholesale seller and properly attributable to conveying the tomatoes from the point of delivery to the wholesale seller to the point of delivery by him; and
- (c) margin at the rate of ½d. per pound, subject however, in respect of deliveries within a prescribed area, to an upper limit of 8d. per pound:

Provided that no amount shall be added under the provisions of this paragraph for cost of transport unless such amount is recorded by the wholesale seller in relation to those tomatoes.

Sales by retail.

6. I fix and declare the maximum price at which tomatoes may be sold by retail in Queensland to be the sum of the following:—

- (a) the price paid or payable for the tomatoes by the retail seller or the maximum price fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order for the sale of the tomatoes to the retail seller, whichever is the lesser;
- (b) cost of transport actually incurred by the retail seller and properly attributable to conveying the tomatoes to his place of sale; and
- (c) margin at the rate of 3d. per pound, subject however, in respect of sales in a prescribed area, to an upper limit of 1½d. per pound:

Provided that no amount shall be added under the provisions of this paragraph for cost of transport unless such amount is recorded on an invoice delivered in relation to those tomatoes.

Sales by the case.

7. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which tomatoes may be sold by the case in Queensland to be—

- (a) the maximum price fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order for the sale of the tomatoes actually contained in such case; or
- (b) the maximum price so fixed for the sale of—
 - (i) in respect of a half bushel case—24 pounds weight;
 - (ii) in respect of a three-quarter bushel case—36 pounds weight; or
 - (iii) in respect of a bushel case—48 pounds weight,

whichever is the lesser.

Variation of maximum prices by notice.

8. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which tomatoes specified in a notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

A little later the advance of his Company was again held up by a heavy machine gun firing across the front.

Without hesitation, Corporal Rattey rushed the gun and silenced it with fire from his Bren gun used from his hip. When one had been killed and another wounded, the remaining enemy's gun-crew broke and fled. The machine gun and two thousand rounds of ammunition were captured, and the Company again continued its advance which was consolidated.

A serious situation was turned into a brilliant success, entirely by the courage, cool planning and stern determination of Corporal Rattey. His bravery was an incentive to the entire Company, who fought with inspiration derived from the gallantry of Corporal Rattey, despite the stubborn opposition to which they were subjected.

DEPARTMENT OF WORKS AND HOUSING (FUNCTIONS) ORDER.
Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as the Department of Works and Housing (Functions) Order.

Definitions.

2. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears:—
"Department" includes an Authority under a Department;

"the Department" means the Department of Works and Housing;

"works" includes—

- (a) the construction, extension, alteration, maintenance and repair of all buildings and engineering works for a Department, including the preparation of architectural and engineering designs, reports and estimates, in accordance with the requirements of the Department concerned;
- (b) the supply and maintenance of office furniture and fittings for a Department;
- (c) the supply and maintenance of fire protection services and equipment for a Department;
- (d) the transfer of a Department from one location to another; and
- (e) the construction, installation, supply, maintenance and repair of plant and machinery for a Department, other than special plant and appliances for the establishment and maintenance of special Departmental facilities.

Application of order.

3. The Order shall apply to works for which funds have been provided by law for expenditure by the Department or made available to the Department from other sources, but do not include the following:—

(a) *Departments of Navy, Army, Air and Munitions.*—

The provision of the following:—

- (i) Equipment for and the construction and maintenance of vessels;
- (ii) The fitting of transports;
- (iii) Wireless installations;
- (iv) Equipment for radar and navigational aids and tele-communication installations; (the provision of buildings of a temporary or permanent nature to house these installations to be the responsibility of the Department of Works and Housing);
- (v) Camp equipment;
- (vi) Equipment for installation and maintenance of war-like armament equipment.

(b) *Postmaster-General's Department.*—Works in connexion with telegraph and telephone wires; submarine cables; fitting up switchboards, instruments, and appliances in connexion with telegraph, telephone and radio services; the provision of special furniture and fittings for the Department.

(c) *Department of Supply and Shipping.*—Construction, alteration, maintenance and repair of steamers, launches and boats; installation of apparatus for lighthouse services (except when it forms a section of a building or structure being erected, altered or repaired by the Department of Works and Housing) and the maintenance and repair of apparatus and associated plant.

(d) *Department of Civil Aviation.*—Repair and maintenance of aircraft and vessels; provision, installation and maintenance of radio and navigational equipment.

(e) *Department of Aircraft Production.*—Provision and maintenance of plant and machinery for production and repair of aircraft.

(f) *Department of the Treasury.*—Provision and maintenance of plant and machinery for the Government Printing Office, Canberra.

(g) *Council for Scientific and Industrial Research.*—Works in connexion with buildings, plant and the like which are to be erected or maintained in accordance with an agreement of co-operation between the Council and another party wherever the terms or conditions of the agreement render it impracticable for the Council to have the work carried out by the Department.

Functions of Department of Works and Housing.

4. Except as otherwise provided by any Act or regulation under any Act, or by agreement or arrangement between the Commonwealth and a State or an authority of the Commonwealth or of a State, the Department of Works and Housing shall be responsible for the following:—

- (a) The design, estimate of cost, supervision and execution of all architectural and engineering works (both capital and maintenance) for the Commonwealth Government and such other works as may be requested by a State or an authority of the Commonwealth or of a State;
- (b) The inspection of all works and advice to the Department concerned as to necessary maintenance and the estimated cost of such maintenance;
- (c) The formulation of proposals for the co-ordination of works projects independently initiated by two or more Departments;
- (d) The formulation of town planning proposals in areas controlled by the Commonwealth in collaboration with other responsible Departments;
- (e) Technical advice in relation to Commonwealth Works programmes;
- (f) The investigation, planning and development of such works of national importance as are referred to the Department by the Commonwealth Government;
- (g) Technical advice to the Commonwealth in relation to works of a State, or of an authority of a State, in which the Commonwealth has a direct financial interest, and, if so directed by the Commonwealth Government, the design or execution of those works;
- (h) Collaboration with Commonwealth and State Departments and authorities and local authorities on regional and town planning insofar as it affects Commonwealth works;
- (i) The submission to the Defence Services of works proposals or works plans (other than Defence Works) for which the Commonwealth is wholly or partially responsible, and which the Department considers may have strategic significance;
- (j) Collaboration in research carried out by Commonwealth and State Departments or authorities in relation to works and the circulation of relevant data to interested Departments or authorities; and also the planning and conduct of such further research as the Department considers necessary in relation to matters affecting the planning, design and execution of works.

Execution of minor works.

5. Where the Department is satisfied that it would be economical or desirable so to do, the Department may arrange for another Department to carry out minor works and the day to day maintenance of that other Department.

IN pursuance of the powers vested in me by the *Defence Act 1903-1941* and of all other powers me thereunto enabling, I, Winston Dugan, the Deputy of the Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Commonwealth of Australia, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, hereby delegate to every officer of the Military Forces who shall at any time during the continuance of this delegation be holding the office or performing the duties of Commander, Second Australian Prisoner of War Reception Group, the following powers in connexion with any part or parts of the Australian Military Forces under the command of Commander Second Australian Prisoner of War Reception Group, when beyond the limits of the Commonwealth—

1. (a) the power to convene courts-martial;
- (b) the power to appoint officers to constitute courts-martial;
- (c) the power to confirm the finding, or finding and sentence of any court-martial (other than, in the case of an officer, a sentence of death or a sentence of penal servitude or imprisonment, or to be cashiered or dismissed from His Majesty's Service or from the Defence Force, or, in the case of a soldier, a sentence of death or a sentence of penal servitude or imprisonment exceeding a term of two years), or to send back the finding and sentence or either of them for revision;
- (d) the power to mitigate or remit the punishment or any part of the punishment awarded by any sentence, or to commute the punishment for any less punishment to which the offender might have been sentenced by the court-martial; and
- (e) the power to suspend the execution or currency of any sentence on such terms and conditions (if any) as he thinks fit.
2. The power to transfer officers and soldiers from one unit or corps to another unit or corps.
3. The power to return to Australia either through any organization created for administrative purposes or otherwise, officers and soldiers medically unfit or for any other reason whatsoever.
4. The power, subject to any direction that may be given by the Minister, to enter into contracts not exceeding an expenditure of one thousand pounds sterling in respect of any one contract for and on behalf of the Commonwealth Government or otherwise to buy, hire, requisition or provide supplies, material, land and building required to equip, maintain, quarter and accommodate any part or parts of the Australian Forces under his command when beyond the limits of the Commonwealth but not exceeding the sum of one thousand pounds in respect of any one such transaction: Provided that the exercise of the power given by this paragraph will be subject to agreement with the Commander-in-Chief of the Force with which the Australian Forces under his command are serving and also subject to such agreements as may be made between the Governments of the United Kingdom or India and Australia.
5. The power to administer, subject to the provisions of the *Defence Act 1903-1941* and any regulation made thereunder and any instructions of the Minister, the pay and finances of
